Purpose. - (3) Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) Standard PHA A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceeds 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS or SEMAP assessments.
- (5) Troubled PHA A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) Qualified PHA A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined, and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled

B.4 Most Recent Fiscal Year Audit:

- (a) Were there any findings in the most recent FY audit? YES
- (b) If yes, please describe

1. 2018-001 Eligibility Housing Choice Voucher

Finding: Income calculations performed during examinations contained errors and documentation obtained to determine annual income was insufficient or incomplete. PHA's are required to determine income eligibility and calculate the tenant's rent payment using sufficient, appropriate documentation in accordance with HUD regulations.

Questioned cost: Known questioned costs totaled \$5,750

Effect or Potential Effect: Overpayment of Housing Assistance Payments due to income calculation errors.

Cause: Lack of staff adherence to administrative policies relating to annualizing wages and ineffective quality control procedures.

Auditors Recommendation: We recommend the Authority update income calculation policies used to annualize employment income and monitor staff performance, including increased quality control reviews, to insure compliance with HUD regulations. Further, additional training is recommended regarding determining what source of income documentation is required in certain situations (employment change, sporadic or inconsistent wages, etc.)

Management Response: CCHRA staff were instructed at time of audit that calculating income using year to date wages is prohibited.

2. 2018-002 Procurement Public Housing

Finding: Procurement and/or contract files did not sufficiently document the history of procurement, including selection and rationale for procurement method. Authorities are required to comply with provisions of A-102 Common Rule and its procurement policy in accordance with program and federal requirements.

Effect or Potential Effect: Potential costs incurred that were not reasonable

Cause: Staff turnover whereby the Authority was unable to locate contract files selected during audit testing.

Auditor's Recommendation: We recommend the Authority establish a formal contract register to track and document procurements performed. Register should list, at a minimum, type of procurement, term of contract and contract amounts. In addition, contract files should be retained to document procurement history including rationale, selection and award amounts in accordance with its procurement policy.

Management Response: The Procurement Department will be reorganized with appropriate staff. Capital expense projects will be managed by the CEO until the appropriate persons/contractors have been identified. An anticipated budget has been developed for FY2016-2019.

Progress Report.

Provide a description of the PHA's progress in meeting its Mission and Goals described in the PHA 5-Year and Annual Plan

- 1. Increase CCHRA net operating income through actions aimed at increasing funding and decreasing operational costs. CCHRA is pursuing several actions aimed at increasing non-HUD revenue. The beauty shop area is in the process of being reopened and six chairs will be leased to beauticians at a projected annual revenue of \$36,000. 90 percent of this revenue will be utilized for building maintenance with the remaining 10 percent used to reimburse the FSS program which will manage the operation. Chairs will be leased first to interested Section 8 voucher holders, then to public housing residents, and finally to other low income residents. In addition, rents charged on office space in the upstairs penthouse area will be increased to generate additional revenue. On the cost reduction side of the equation, several actions have been taken. Under the leadership of the new ED, much closer attention is being paid to the operating budget. Site based budgeting has been implemented and all staff are being trained in budgeting. The external security contract of \$100,000 has been eliminated and CCHRA is partnering with local police departments to establish a satellite station at Joseph Floyd Manor. The human resource and IT functions have both been contracted out generating another \$200,000 in annual savings. Unneeded vehicles are being disposed of and vaxant staff positions not being filled are also generating savings. Finally, CCHRA has severed ties with the CCHRA Foundation and is no longer doing accounting and maintenance, both of which were previously done without reimbursement.
- 2. Take necessary actions to improve all aspects of CCHRA staff and BOC operations. The new CEO conducted a SWOT analysis with staff shortly after taking over and a number of actions were taken based on the weaknesses and opportunities identified. Extensive cross-training has been conducted between departments. Staff training has been accomplished in the areas of budgeting, systems management, and general business/personal development topics, as well as OSHA topics, etiquette, and rent calculation procedures. Our Human Resource consultant has created a training program with budget money set aside for training. Finally, staff restructuring has been accomplished and a capital budget created within the agency. Timelines are now being utilized to better manage capital improvements. In addition, The ED is in the process of taking the Executive Director Education Program offered by Rutgers University Center for Government Excellence and will complete that program this year. With respect to BOC operations, extensive turnover on the BOC this past year has limited Board improvement actions. The ED developed a Board Welcome and Orientation Packet that gives new members information on how all departments and CCHRA programs work. Budget variance reports are now being given to the BOC so they can have a better idea of how agency resources are being utilized.
- 3. Pursue initiatives aimed at building stronger relationships within the community, state, nation, and the housing authority. The new ED has spent much of the past year reviewing and improving internal CCHRA operations and focusing on operational and capital budget management. Since he is new to the Charleston area, BOC members have offered to make introductions to community leaders and those meetings have begun and will continue this year.
- 4. Improve public relations and communication, both internal and external. See response to objective 3 above.
- **5.** Take actions to improve quality of life for CCHRA residents. New water and heating systems have been installed at Joseph Floyd Manor. The lobby and restroom areas at JFM have been painted and spruced up and plans are to repaint common areas on every floor in the coming year. A new tenant security system has been installed at Joseph Floyd Manor, with every external and elevator entrance covered and monitored. This high tech system allows lobby monitoring of the building by volunteer desk staff and the ability to immediately seek police assistance if needed and provide video/photographs of crimes or suspicious activity. At Brighton Place, extensive roof repairs are being undertaken. Finally, interns from Trident Technical College continue to volunteer providing resident assistance as needed.
- **6. Expand housing opportunities for the citizens served by CCHRA.** CCHRA plans to request HUD approval to sell 18 scattered site housing units in order to generate revenue for redevelopment to increase availability of quality affordable housing in the area. In addition, CCHRA is giving consideration to granting a land lease to a local non-profit organization to construct additional housing units on its site adjacent to Joseph Floyd Manor at no cost or responsibility to CCHRA.
